






- ALARM survey now in its 24th year launched 26 March.




DfT funding split

ALARM 2019: KEY FINDINGS – LONG-TERM UNDERFUNDING OF LOCAL ROAD NETWORK







LOCAL AUTHORITIES HAVE A STATUTORY OBLIGATION TO MAINTAIN ROADS:

SECTION 41 HIGHWAYS ACT 1980 : "THE HIGHWAY AUTHORITY ... ARE UNDER A DUTY TO MAINTAIN THE HIGHWAY..."

LGA: LOCAL SERVICES IN ENGLAND WILL FACE A FUNDING GAP OF ALMOST £8 BILLION BY 2025.




ENGLISH ROADS FUNDING: DISPARITY OF FUNDING

"THE GOVERNMENT PLANS TO SPEND £1.1 MILLION PER MILE TO MAINTAIN ITS STRATEGIC ROAD NETWORK BETWEEN 2015 AND 2020. IN COMPARISON IT WILL PROVIDE COUNCILS WITH JUST £21,000 PER MILE FOR THE LOCAL ROADS THEY MAINTAIN OVER THE SAME PERIOD." LOCAL GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION








LOCAL ROAD NETWORK

Highway maintenance budget range


per mile of local road

ALARM 2019 FINDINGS: BUDGETS


 Overall the total highway maintenance budgets reported have increased by around 20%.

However:

The amount spent on the carriageway itself is down from 56% to 54%.

And:

- The headline numbers obscure that there have been winners and losers when it comes to budgets.
- A quarter of English councils reported a cut in total highway maintenance budget.
- " In Wales & London, this was half of all authorities



ALARM 2019 FINDINGS: BUDGET SHORTFALL

- Budget shortfall the difference between the annual budget that highway departments calculate they require to keep the carriageway in reasonable order and the amount they actually receive.
- The shortfall reported in ALARM 2019 is £657m in England the equivalent of £3.9m per authority up from £3.3m per authority last year.
- 40% of local authorities reported transferring capital funds for highways improvements into revenue budgets for maintenance work.

ALARM 2019 FINDINGS: ONE TIME CATCH UP COST

Average one-off investment required to clear carriageway maintenance backlog per authority, £m (2017/18 in brackets)




Maintenance backlog

- road conditions since last year despite reported increase in budgets.
- Exception in London with marked increase in those classed as poor.
- 20% of roads classed as structurally poor with less than 5 year's life remaining. This is equivalent to 41,575 miles of road.

ALARM 2019 FINDINGS: STRUCTURAL ROAD CONDITIONS

Road Condition Index

by road category (%)

KEY: GREEN: carriageway in a good state of repair

Same as ALARM survey 2018

- AMBER: carriageway where some deterioration is apparent
- RED: carriageway in poor overall condition likely to require maintenance in the next 12 months

- New area of survey from 2018.
- Highlights continued prioritisation on principal roads.
- 75% target on principal roads = only 11% of total network length.



Generally a marked decrease in road surfacing frequency for all classes of road.


ALARM 2018 FINDINGS: ROAD SURFACING FREQUENCY

- The total cost of handing and settling claims reported as more than £27m.
- , 89% of claims relate specifically to pothole damage.



17. £30 billion to improve roads

A £28.8 billion National Roads Fund, paid for by road tax, includes £25.3 billion for the Strategic Road Network (motorways, trunk and A roads). The largest ever investment of this kind.

It will also help fund the new network of local roads (known as the Major Road Network), and larger local road projects.

Local authorities will receive £420 million to fix potholes on roads and renew bridges and tunnels, and there will be a £150 million to improve local traffic hotspots such as roundabouts.

Northern Ireland in state of alarm with £1.2bn backlog


Northern Ireland's roads maintenance backlog has hit £1.2bn, on the back of average annual funding shortfalls of £50m, national auditors have estimated.

The Comptroller and Auditor General outlined in a new report how 'decades of funding shortfalls are having a deteriorating effect on the overall condition of Northern Ireland's road network'.

'Whilst the overall level of funding has improved, it is still less than required to maintain network condition in a satisfactory, steady state. As a result, the [Department for Infrastructure's] estimated amount of investment required to clear the overall structural maintenance backlog has increased from £168 million (at today's value) in 1998, to £1.2 billion,' the report found.
